16 The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Asse
17 bly, do enact as follows:

19 Section 1. Subparagraph (vi) of paragraph (c) of subdivision 4
20 section 209 of the civil service law, as amended by chapter 205 of t
21 laws of 1997, is amended to read as follows:

22 (vi) the determination of the public arbitration panel shall be fin
23 and binding upon the parties for the period prescribed by the panel, b
24 in no event shall such period exceed two years from the termination da
25 of any previous collective bargaining agreement or if there is no prev
26 ous collective bargaining agreement then for a period not to exceed t
27 years from the date of determination by the panel. Such determinati
28 shall not be subject to the approval of any local legislative body
29 other municipal authority. Notwithstanding the provisions of th
30 subparagraph to the contrary, where the parties to a public arbitrat
31 are those anticipated by the provisions of [~~paragraph~~] paragraphs (
32 and (f) of this subdivision [~~as established by chapter four hundr~~
33 [~~thirty two of the laws of nineteen hundred ninety five,~~] the state
34 such parties may agree to confer authority to the public arbitrat
35 panel to issue a final and binding determination for a period up to a

§ 20. This act shall take effect immediately and shall be deemed to have been in full force and effect on and after April 1, 2003, provided, however, that the amendments to subdivision 4 of section 209 of the civil service law made by section one of this act shall expire on the same date such subdivision expires.

FISCAL NOTE.--Pursuant to Legislative Law, Section 50:

This bill would provide certain retroactive payments for peace officers in the New York State department of correctional services, and would provide that these retroactive payments would be included in the entirety in the final average salary calculation.

If this bill is enacted, these affected officers who retire prior April 1, 2010 may receive greater pension benefits than they otherwise would have without this legislation. The additional pension payments will be borne by the State of New York, and the total amount of the payments will depend upon the number of retirees affected and the specific circumstances.
