

Inmate Attacks Officer at Marcy Correctional Facility

Officer Sustains Facial, Hand and Knee Injuries

Marcy, NY – A 26-year-old inmate at Marcy Correctional Facility attacked and injured an officer who attempted to stop him from running down the facility walkway at the medium security correctional facility on October 3.

The officer observed the inmate running past him on the walkway and ordered the inmate to stop. The inmate turned towards the officer and lunged at him with a closed fist, missed striking him, knocking the officer backward with his body. The officer immediately grabbed the inmate by his shirt and forced him to the ground. The inmate broke free and stood back up. The officer administered OC spray which had no effect. The inmate charged the officer again, knocking him backwards. The officer grabbed the inmate by his shirt again and forced him to the ground. On the ground and still combative, the inmate began throwing punches, striking the officer in the left side of the face. The officer was able to apply one handcuff to the inmate's left wrist. A second officer arrived at the attack and forced the inmate's right wrist behind his back and applied the other handcuff.

Still on the floor and combative, the inmate attempted to kick both officers before they subdued his legs. Once under control, the inmate became compliant and was escorted by staff to the infirmary for decontamination.

The injured officer was treated by medical staff at the facility for bruising and abrasions to his hands, left side of his face, and both knees. He was treated and remained on duty.

The inmate is serving a five-year sentence after being convicted in Chautauqua in 2023 for Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 3rd and Attempted Criminal Possession of a Weapon 2nd.

"The inmate who committed this latest assault on staff is scheduled for a parole hearing next spring. It provides an opportunity for the Onieda County District Attorney to send a strong message to inmates who are serving short sentences that attacks on staff will not be tolerated and will be prosecuted. Without any real discipline left in prisons because of HALT, successfully prosecuting anyone who attacks and injures staff for felony assault would make inmates think twice about doing it in the future." — said Bryan Hluska, Central Region Vice President
