"Could New York State become a 'Right-To-Work' State?," asked Desjardins as a hush fell over the nearly 60 who attended the evening meeting. "Could the Koch Brothers 'get their wav?"

In the upcoming General Election that will be held on November 7th, voters will be asked whether or not New York should hold a convention to change its constitution.

Should voters be hoodwinked into thinking this a good thing - hard fought for and taken-for-granted Pensions, Prevailing Wages, Collective Bargaining and Health Care and Benefits for injured Workers could all be on the chopping block, the State Union Representatives warned.

A Constitutional Convention would be controlled by well-funded special interests and career politicians, who would dominate the process and take advantage of the system to benefit themselves at taxpayer expense, the Statewide Union Representatives said.
