## Officer Injured at Groveland Correctional Facility

## Attacked by Two Inmates During Routine Search

**SONYEA, N.Y.** – A corrections officer at Groveland Correctional Facility was attacked and injured by two inmates on Saturday, December 23, 2017, while conducting a routine search of an inmate's dorm cubicle.

The officer was searching the living area of an inmate's cube at approximately 11 a.m. when the inmate entered the living area. After refusing to follow repeated orders to leave the area, the inmate approached the officer and, unprovoked, punched him in the face with a closed fist. The officer began to struggle with the inmate and was struck in the face a second time. Moments later, a second inmate entered the cube and began to attack the officer, striking the officer several times in the face and head.

A second officer heard the altercation and ran to assist the officer. With the help of additional staff, the assisting officer was able to get the second inmate under control and into mechanical restraints. The officer who was initially attacked was eventually able to get the first inmate under control and into restraints.

Three officers were treated by medical staff at the facility and were transported to a local hospital for additional treatment. The officer who was initially attacked was treated for a laceration over his left eye, laceration to his chest, and a bloody nose and lip. He was treated and released from the hospital. The two other officers were treated and released for minor injuries sustained during the struggle. The three officers did not return to duty.

The two inmates involved were transferred to Attica Correctional Facility following the incident. They face internal disciplinary charges as well as criminal charges.

"It is unfortunate as we come to the end of the 2017 that this latest attack symbolizes what our members have faced for the past several years across the state in our prisons - a violent and aggressive inmate who show no reluctance to attacking staff at any given time. As assaults on staff continue at record numbers, there is no level of discipline that exists to deter inmates from unprovoked attacks ." – Joe Miano, NYSCOPBA Western Region Vice President.
