 4 if you recall Acting
 5 Commissioner Annucci in
 6 his testimony acknowledged
 7 the fact if the double
 8 bunks were to come down,
 9 there would be no need to
 10 close any jails. I don't
 11 want to quote him, that's
 12 they way he put it, that
 13 was the way he reference
 14 it.
 15 So that's our push and
 16 that's been our push from
 17 the beginning. Once --
 18 you know, double bunking
 19 is not new to us, we have
 20 been pushing to get this.
 21 We've been fortunate to
 22 find sponsors in both
 23 houses to carry this, a

28

1 same as bill.
2 The one in the Assembly
3 is moving somewhat nicely
4 for us, controlled by
5 Assemblyman Billy Jones,
6 former correction officer
7 out of Bare Hill. He's
8 now State Assemblyman in
9 the 16th District maybe.
10 And as many of you might
11 recall, Senator Gallavan
12 in the previous senate
13 majority, carried the
14 double bunking bill for
15 us. And last year he was
16 gracious enough to pass it
17 of his sponsorship, pass
18 that, as bill over to
19 Senate Sepulveda, who

21 committee for the State
22 senate, Crime and
23 Corrections.

1 We had our legislative
2 reception not too long
3 ago, that went off well.
4 We were able to get around
5 some things. I had a
6 conversation with Senate
7 Sepulveda, he had some
8 confusion there but we got
9 him back on track. He's a
10 confusing individual to
11 begin with and we'll keep
12 a close tab on him as we
13 proceed forward.

14 A lot of things have
15 happened recently, please
16 keep an eye out for your
17 brothers and sisters in
18 the field. The changes
19 that continually come,
20 excuse me. And I
21 recognize that you're
22 handling them and you're
23 doing them and doing

1 everything you can, since
2 implementing these in the
3 facilities.

4 But the Department is
5 constantly taking a
6 different position,
7 without any adequate
8 training. That training
9 is a component we're
10 continually pushing. I
11 know individuals with
12 twenty-five years, I'm
13 redundant with this, but I
14 get the same forty hour
15 training that I got in
16 1989, you know. And that
17 forty hours and the vast
18 changes in this Department
19 is not sufficient.

20 That's some of the
21 conversations that we're
22 having with the agency and
23 with the legislature.

1 We're getting a little
2 play with that. But our
3 primary focus right now is
4 these double bunks and
5 stave off any prison
6 closures. And to help
7 somewhat reduce the amount
8 of violence that we're
9 continually dealing with
10 in our facilities.

11 That includes, and I'm
12 sure I'm going to hear it
13 from people in here today,
14 but that includes a
15 significant need for
16 additional staffing. And
17 the staff that's owed me,
18 the staff that's owed this
19 body, that's owed certain
20 facilities in the last
21 round of reviews, staffing
22 reviews that were done in
23 2017.

1 You can be rest assured
2 I'm not letting up on that
3 and I'll continue to push
4 that until you kick me to
5 the curb, but that will be
6 priority number one; the
7 staffing issue and this
8 double bunking issue.

9 We got a budget session
10 right now that has taken
11 an interesting twist as of
12 late. And I didn't play a
13 whole lot of drama or
14 concern into this
15 coronavirus thing, but you
16 look at what other
17 entities are doing and
18 many other establishments
19 are doing as far as
20 governmental operations
21 and you're starting to see
22 some of these things that
23 are coming to light.

1 is complete; and proper
2 protocols, basically
3 supplies. The soaps, the
4 hand sanitizers, the
5 constant reminders of the
6 general precautions that
7 need to be taken in our

13 are, and if there is any
14 transportation officers in
15 here forgive me, but we
16 basically said we don't
17 want any unnecessary
18 medical transports leaving
19 the facilities at this
20 point to avoid
21 contamination. We want
22 all visit rooms shuttered
23 until this contamination

1 place on the 16th, but
2 we're still tentatively
3 scheduled for the 16th.
4 They were quick to turn
5 around this date when we
6 submitted this agenda, so
7 we're -- if they do
8 cancel, we're hoping we
9 would be able to
10 reschedule that as soon as
11 possible.

12 With that being said,
13 we got a lot of irons in
14 the fire. This
15 coronavirus thing, not
16 only is it a concern
17 inside your facilities,
18 but it's gonna be a
19 concern from a
20 governmental standpoint.
21 The Governor has already
22 asked the comptroller for
23 additional projection in

1 revenues going forward,
2 how this may affect what
3 the projected revenues.
4 He's working with the
5 comptroller.
6 Many of you know the
7 comptroller is a very
8 close friend of NYSCOPBA,
9 has been since Donn's
10 term, really since he's
11 been in office. We've had
12 a good relationship with
13 the comptroller's office
14 from the beginning.
15 If anybody paid
16 attention last night,
17 minus this coronavirus and
18 these projected revenues
19 that may be coming in or
20 concerns for projected
21 revenues. If you take a
22 look at what it's done to
23 this hotel, typically when

1 we come here that parking
2 lot is full. They
3 canceled four conventions
4 already.
5 They've canceled four.
6 So this thing is gonna
7 have an impact to a degree
8 in governmental operations
9 and that's going to
10 include our ability to
11 maneuver. We'll stay on
12 top of it, continue to
13 stay on top of it and
14 continue to keep moving,
15 especially this double
16 bunking issue.
17 As I mentioned it's
18 moving well in the

15 letting visits in.

16 PRESIDENT POWERS: In
17 my opinion from what I get
18 out of it is they're not
19 concerned about it. It's
20 the same old battle, they
21 don't give a shit about
22 what our concerns are.
23 They're more worried about

45

1 the backlash that they're
2 going to get from the
3 visitors and the families
4 that are involved in
5 wanting to come up and
6 visit and to be able to
7 promote the contraband.

8 Their position was,
9 okay, you know, they
10 listened and then we start
11 to see little pithily
12 changes here. We tell
13 them that we're constantly
14 trying to be proactive,
15 get out in front of it.
16 What are you doing and
17 more importantly, what are
18 you going to do God forbid
19 there's a contamination in
20 a facility?

21 Because everything
22 shut -- as you're well
23 aware around the world,

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1 everything shuts right
2 down, right? So, what are
3 you going to do and what
4 procedures, we want to see
5 those procedures. We want
6 to be a part of the
7 discussion, which we very
8 seldom get any more, but
9 we want to be a part of
10 that discussion.

11 So what am I getting
12 back? The hokey interview
13 for now, but we'll
14 continue to push.

15 KEVIN DONNELLY: So
16 once again, their
17 employees are on the back
18 burner?

19 PRESIDENT POWERS:
20 Pretty much. That's how I
21 got into a pretty lengthy
22 diatribe just recently
23 with the Department over

47

1 morale and the way you
2 treat your employees.
3 Your employees are our
4 members, but they're your
5 employees. And your
6 management skills, quite
7 frankly, suck shit. And
8 that's a quote, suck shit.

9 KEVIN DONNELLY: Well,
10 at least we got --

11 PRESIDENT POWERS: And
12 I'll be honest with you,
13 Deputy Commissioner
14 O'Gorman supports shutting
15 down visit rooms.

16 KEVIN DONNELLY: I
17 won't even ask the next
18 question.

19 PRESIDENT POWERS: He
20 said it to me and I told
21 him that I was gonna share
22 it. He said he didn't
23 care, I think he's

48

1 thinking of retirement.
 2 Debbie?
 3 MS. FLOYD: Floyd from
 4 Bedford. What are we
 5 gonna do about our
 6 executive team at
 7 facilities making
 8 determinations? Like for
 9 me for instance, they
 10 kicked me out of the jail
 11 on Sunday because they
 12 thought I had the
 13 coronavirus. And they
 14 took away my overtime,
 15 they charged me a sick day
 16 and didn't let me come
 17 back to work Sunday,
 18 Monday; and they called me
 19 Monday about five or
 20 something, said I could
 21 come back without a note
 22 Tuesday.

23 PRESIDENT POWERS: I

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1 don't -- that's news to
 2 me. I know they sent a
 3 bunch of people home with
 4 a cold apparently.
 5 MS. FLOYD: They sent
 6 me or Officer Torres home,
 7 I don't even know when she
 8 left cause I left before
 9 her.
 10 PRESIDENT POWERS: You
 11 got to start to take that
 12 up with your
 13 administration and by all
 14 means keep Dave looped in,
 15 and if you need any
 16 assistance let us know.
 17 MS. FLOYD: Yeah, but
 18 what if they do that to
 19 somebody else? I mean,
 20 they just did it at
 21 Bedford, with if any other
 22 facilities get this kind
 23 of.

50

1 PRESIDENT POWERS: We
 2 got to know about it.
 3 Dave mentioned it to me
 4 yesterday. I was under
 5 the impression it was a
 6 handful of people but, you
 7 know, it could have been
 8 another conversation.
 9 We've been having a lot of
 10 conversations.

11 DAVE LUTHER: Thanks,
 12 George. Just as to follow
 13 up to Ms. Floyd's comment.
 14 In our conversations with
 15 O'Gorman, I don't know if
 16 it will happen in other
 17 jails because he said that
 18 he found that Bedford was
 19 a little over zealous in
 20 their determination as to
 21 who should go home and who
 22 shouldn't. As of the rest
 23 of employees we'll have to

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1 work out as far as
 2 occasions and stuff like
 3 that, whether it goes
 4 for -- was it two or
 5 three?

6 Anyway, everybody got
 7 told to come back to work
 8 after calls were made and
 9 it was addressed. So,
 10 until they can argue this,
 11 until they can get around
 12 the HIPPA Law number one,
 13 and before they can all
 14 determine that they have
 15 medical degrees, they
 16 don't have the right to
 17 make that assumption
 18 unless it's quite apparent
 19 that there is an issue.

20 PRESIDENT POWERS
 21 Thank you, Dave. George.
 22 GEORGE KARAMANOS:
 23 George KARAMANOS out of

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1 Green Correctional. Just
2 to get some clarification
3 on the recording devices
4 that OSI will be bringing
5 in. Is this at the
6 facilities they'll be
7 bringing them in?

8 PRESIDENT POWERS: Yes.

9 GEORGE KARAMANOS: So,
10 what exactly is going to
11 be? Is it for -- I'm
12 confused.

13 PRESIDENT POWERS: So,
14 say there's an incident,
15 Mike and George are
16 involved in the incident,
17 Tammy witnessed it.
18 They're not going to be --
19 allegedly they said
20 they're not going to be
21 questioning us, this isn't
22 an interrogation. Correct
23 me if I'm wrong, Mike.

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1 be going to Albany or
2 Utica or Fishkill,
3 wherever else they're
4 doing interrogations,
5 where there's a
6 stenographer present.
7 That's still going to
8 happen for targets of an
9 investigation.

10 These minor
11 investigations that they
12 normally do at your
13 correctional facilities,
14 where they, you know,
15 maybe pat and frisk wrong,
16 whatever they do when they
17 come into the facility,
18 they're there ten minutes
19 asking questions and
20 handwrite that piece of
21 paper out, make it look
22 like you said what they
23 wrote, they're not going

55

1 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
2 Let me help you. Good
3 afternoon. So, we
4 attended this meeting
5 regarding recording
6 device. We were notified
7 a little while back that
8 OSI will be bringing
9 recording devices into the
10 facilities in order to
11 conduct their interviews.

12 So basically, how they
13 normally take notes,
14 handwritten notes as
15 they're asking them
16 questions, now there's
17 going to be a recording
18 devices for the statement,
19 is what they're saying.

20 So what Mike is talking
21 about, they're saying
22 targets of the
23 investigation will still

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1 to do that anymore. Now
2 they're just going to
3 record it. So, question?
4 KEVIN DONNELLY: Kevin
5 Donnelly, Coxsackie.
6 Mike, Dave, John, myself,
7 few others in the room,
8 this was a subject of
9 negotiations and that was
10 pulled off the table.

11 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
12 That might have been the
13 subject of negotiation
14 before I got on the
15 negotiating team, because
16 I don't recall it being on
17 the table.

18 KEVIN DONNELLY: It
19 was. It was pulled off.

20 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
21 When Mike Dildine was on
22 it?

23 KEVIN DONNELLY: Yes.

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1 But it was pulled off the
2 table and so, why are we
3 allowing this to happen?

4 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
5 Number one, you can't stop
6 it. Because there's not a
7 provision in the contract
8 that says they can't
9 record it. Basically the
10 provision about a
11 recording device being
12 mutual is during a
13 disciplinary proceeding.
14 Not -- and questioning by
15 OSI is not a disciplinary
16 proceeding. Can it lead
17 to discipline? Possibly.
18 But it's not considered
19 part of the discipline
20 procedure.

21 KEVIN DONNELLY: John,
22 can you speak on that? No
23 offense, Mike.

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1 with you, it wasn't a long
2 discussion, but it was
3 something we discussed
4 about what that meant in
5 the Bill of Rights. And
6 to be honest, I don't
7 remember what was said
8 after that.

9 But I know the
10 discussion was about, what
11 they've always told us and
12 we've disagreed with it,
13 but they'll give us a copy
14 of the tape. But I know
15 we were looking to expand
16 the Bill of Rights to
17 include all -- I believe
18 everything, when we first
19 started. This was like
20 six years ago.

21 So I don't know who
22 else in the committee has
23 any more knowledge. I

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1 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
2 No offense taken. Only a
3 few months left to go,
4 pal.

5 KEVIN DONNELLY: God
6 bless you.

7 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
8 HARMON: John Harmon, Law
9 Enforcement VP. Very
10 early in negotiations we
11 had a conversation, I
12 don't know if it was an
13 exact proposal or not but
14 we were talking about the
15 Bill of Rights section
16 which says no recording
17 device shall be used.
18 They were trying to expand
19 that.

20 And there was
21 discussion with the state
22 about what that pertains
23 to. And I'll be honest

58

1 know it was talked about
2 but I don't think it went
3 any further than them
4 disagreeing with us and
5 saying we can request a
6 copy of the tape and
7 we had back and forth
8 banter about it, but
9 that's about it.

10 KEVIN DONNELLY: Would
11 that be the same as
12 getting a copy of the Q
13 and A minutes, where it
14 takes forever and a day to
15 get that? I mean, now we
16 get it when they're served
17 their NOD, but when would
18 we be entitled to that?

19 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
20 HARMON: I can tell you
21 for law enforcement, we've
22 had this process for as
23 long as I have been in

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1 Albany. And when I was a
2 chief, we started
3 questioning this. And we
4 receive a copy of the tape
5 typically right after,
6 they burn a copy right
7 after. And I know for the
8 justice center we either
9 get one right after or
10 they send us an encrypted
11 CD as soon as they can get
12 back to their office.

13 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
14 Not to cut you off, John.
15 It is a different
16 procedure with them then
17 it would be with DOCCS.
18 DOCCS' statement at this
19 meeting was that we would
20 receive a copy as
21 contractually provided for
22 Q and As now.

23 So if a member would

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1 receive an NOD based on
2 the interrogation or the
3 questioning, then he would
4 receive a copy of the
5 recording.

6 KEVIN DONNELLY: That's
7 the agreed upon or --

8 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
9 That's we was said. We
10 went to that meeting --

11 DONN ROWE: Because
12 they say a lot of things.

13 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
14 When you say agreed upon,
15 you've got to be careful
16 with the agreed upon.
17 Only because I kind of
18 chaired for the union's
19 side and my first
20 statement was to DOCCS was
21 to let them know that the
22 union does not support the
23 use of recording devices

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1 and we will not agree to
2 it.

3 So, they wanted to end
4 the meeting right then and
5 there. And I said, I'm
6 not saying we don't have
7 questions, I'm just saying
8 we don't agree to the
9 policy. So that's when we
10 started asking questions.
11 We had an attorney in the
12 room as well, Emily was
13 present.

14 And, you know, we asked
15 those types of questions,
16 when would we receive a
17 copy of the tape. So,
18 basically if the officer
19 that's being interviewed
20 gets Notice of Discipline
21 from that interview, then
22 we would get -- actually
23 the Department said per

63

1 the contract the member
2 would get a member of the
3 copy of the tape when he
4 is served with the Notice
5 of discipline.

6 KEVIN DONNELLY:
7 Thank you.

8 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
9 HARMON: Just to add to
10 that, that process exactly
11 works for us as well. We
12 disagree with the taping
13 of the interview or the
14 interrogation, Q and A,
15 whatever it may be and we
16 get the tape. They give
17 it to the member and if
18 we're there, we keep a
19 file, we have a whole
20 filing cabinet OF
21 interrogations with the
22 law firm.

23 CHRIS MOREAU: Chris

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1 Moreau, Green Haven. Will
2 there be gate clearances
3 for these devices that
4 we're going to have to
5 look for?

6 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
7 Being that supposedly from
8 what the Department is
9 saying, is that the Notice
10 of Interrogation will have
11 on their that a recording
12 device will be being used.
13 I'm sure that the
14 Department will consider
15 that as being cleared to
16 come in. Whether they
17 have to ask for a gate
18 clearance in the
19 Department's facilities,
20 they will determine if
21 they get a gate clearance
22 or not.

23 CHRIS MOREAU: They

65

1 just as we know, that
2 those aren't -- those
3 investigations that are
4 conducted at facility
5 levels, aren't of such a
6 nature that they know NODs
7 are coming out of those
8 interviews. That's why
9 they do them there, that's
10 why they handwrite the
11 stuff. They don't bring
12 it up on the record.

13 CHRIS MOREAU: What's
14 to keep them from using it
15 or by turning a would be
16 witness into a target of
17 the investigation.

18 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
19 There's always -- there's
20 nothing stopping them.
21 The same way it is now, if
22 an officer at the facility
23 says something that turns

67

1 said with complete
2 affirmation that the
3 target of the
4 investigation will not be
5 recorded during the
6 proceeding, Q and A?

7 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
8 They said the targets of
9 the investigation will be
10 brought to, we keep saying
11 Albany but we know there's
12 multiple points where they
13 do these Q and As. So, it
14 will still be oath with a
15 stenographer present. The
16 targets of major incidents
17 or of incidents will be
18 sent for those.

19 They said that
20 basically what happens now
21 when OSI goes to a
22 facility to conduct an
23 investigation, they know

66

1 him into a target, what do
2 they normally do? Bring
3 you up to Albany a week
4 later and put you on the
5 record.

6 CHRIS MOREAU: And that
7 recording will be part
8 of --

9 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
10 The recording will be part
11 of the evidence just as
12 the same as the
13 handwritten notes are part
14 of evidence.

15 CHRIS MOREAU: The
16 reasoning behind the
17 recording device, did they
18 elaborate on that.

19 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
20 The Department -- when I
21 say the Department, I
22 mean, Darren Miller I
23 think his name is, Darren

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1 Miller from OSI said
2 because he wants a more
3 accurate investigation
4 done.

5 CHRIS MOREAU: So then
6 could we have the video so
7 we can more accurately do
8 our paperwork?

9 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
10 Well, as you know I
11 already brought that up at
12 the meeting, because I
13 told you that Thursday.
14 Thank you for reminding
15 me. That's what exactly
16 we talked about, the
17 recording was so they
18 could be more accurate in
19 their investigation. I
20 turned around and said,
21 well, based on that logic
22 then we should be able to
23 view a video tape of an

69

1 incident because we could
2 write our reports more
3 accurately. Of course
4 John Shipley got red in
5 the face, very angry at me
6 and said, that's not the
7 same thing. But it is the
8 same thing so --

9 CHRIS MOREAU: Well,
10 because we're making a
11 concession, can't we put
12 it back a little bit
13 with --

14 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
15 We're not making a
16 concession, the Department
17 is telling us a policy
18 that they're implementing.
19 They don't have to tell
20 us. They could have come
21 into the facilities and
22 done it. So they're
23 having a new policy

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1 they're implementing and
2 we are trying to make sure
3 that our members are
4 covered as they should be.

5 CHRIS MOREAU: But we
6 can push back against that
7 policy, can't we?

8 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
9 We can do a lot of things.
10 But, again, our argument
11 was made on the record
12 because we have a
13 recording device, because
14 we recorded the meeting
15 where OSI said why they
16 want to record, for
17 accuracy. My argument
18 about reviewing the video
19 is on the record. So,
20 yes, we are going to move
21 with that probably at our
22 statewide labor management
23 we'll bring it up.

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1 CHRIS MOREAU: All
2 right.

3 AL ZAPPALA: Al
4 Zappala, Shawangunk. This
5 is just back to the issue
6 with the coronavirus. I
7 know people will laugh,
8 but currently we have a
9 quarantined area in New
10 York State that is going
11 to be affecting one of our
12 facilities, where I
13 believe we'll have on
14 average at least six
15 officers that will not be
16 able to make it to work
17 because they're contained
18 within that quarantined
19 area.

20 Will the state be using
21 them for their sick time
22 or will it be in ASX
23 because they're being

72

1 forced not to come to
2 work?
3 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
4 Let me, real quick. The
5 question is, did they
6 change the information
7 about this area you're
8 talking about? Because
9 last night on the news
10 they said that the area
11 down in Rockland County,
12 Westchester County I think
13 it was. They're not
14 preventing people from
15 going in and out of the
16 quarantined area, it's
17 just they won't allow mass
18 gatherings in that area.
19 AL ZAPPALA: My
20 question is, since we are
21 now seeing the first case
22 of a scenario of
23 quarantine, we'll probably

73

1 see more, and I was just
2 curious what the
3 Department stance will be
4 on so we have a head on on
5 it.
6 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
7 Gotcha, Directive 2209.
8 AL ZAPPALA: Thank you.
9 VP NORTH ROBERTS: John
10 Robert, Northern Region
11 VP. Mike, I wanted to
12 touch on OSI committee,
13 recording meeting I
14 attended, I had a lot of
15 questions. I requested
16 that all facility notices
17 also be sent to NYSCOPBA,
18 as many of you know we
19 currently don't receive
20 those notices that the
21 facility received.
22 In my opinion they're
23 insufficient. They don't

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1 provide all the
2 information that you guys
3 should have, like a time
4 seven to three when
5 they're going to have.
6 They're going to hopefully
7 adjust that with the
8 request and also we
9 request to send them down
10 to Bob Cronin at NYSCOPBA
11 and then we forward it to
12 the respective region.
13 Because in the northern
14 region my stance is,
15 myself or business agent
16 will be there. We are
17 going to attend as many as
18 we possibly can. I know
19 we can't be at twelve
20 facilities at all times,
21 but at least when this
22 kicks off, if we file an
23 IP once this is actually

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1 implemented, we can look
2 at it. But we can't fight
3 a policy that's not
4 actually implemented as of
5 yet other than try to
6 negotiate it, as much as
7 possible.
8 So there was a lot of
9 questions and also these
10 statements, take it for
11 what it's worth, Darren
12 Miller said they wouldn't
13 be under oath because OSI
14 has no authority to put
15 you under oath. And
16 hopefully no one signs
17 anything during an
18 interrogation. If that
19 answers a few more
20 questions of where we're
21 at.
22 MIKE CARLSON: Mike
23 Carlson, Forest Rangers.

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1 We had a situation last
2 week where one of our
3 employees, one of the park
4 rangers went to a training
5 over in Dutchess Community
6 College. He got a call
7 this week from the
8 Department of Health New
9 York State indicating that
10 there was a subject in
11 that training who was
12 positive for coronavirus.
13 So, what the Department of
14 Health gentleman told him
15 was he was going to be on
16 the voluntary house
17 quarantine, which we has
18 to stay in his house. He
19 will get paid fourteen
20 days being out from the
21 State. He will get paid
22 his time being home. He
23 did indicate that he had a

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1 wife who is pregnant and a
2 child.
3 They indicated he had
4 no symptoms, he was just
5 in in room with this
6 person who was positive.
7 He was healthy, he says
8 he's still healthy, no
9 issues. But now he's
10 staying home, they said
11 maybe sleep in a different
12 room, this is what they
13 told him. Maybe use a
14 different bathroom,
15 there's nothing to say you
16 have this but he is being
17 paid for the next fourteen
18 days from the date where
19 it occurred.
20 So, he does not have to
21 charge anything to his
22 time accruals. So, he's
23 just taking a fourteen day

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1 siesta.

2 I don't have the memo,
3 this came from the
4 Department of Health.
5 When he got called by the
6 gentleman, we thought it
7 was a gag so then he
8 looked it up on Google and
9 it actually came back it
10 was him.

11 What we were told is if
12 he does get corona,
13 anybody who associated
14 with him while he was at
15 work will also be out for
16 the next fourteen days.
17 So the park manager talked
18 to, I don't know if it was
19 Albany or the region, and
20 said these are the people
21 that he has worked with.
22 So he comes positive, then
23 we're out fourteen days as

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1 well paid leave. And
2 apparently the Governor
3 already approved this.

4 PRESIDENT POWERS: We
5 talked about paid leave
6 aspect regarding
7 coronavirus in the early
8 stages when it first hit
9 New York. And I think it
10 was a five day thing, but
11 that could have preceded
12 that.

13 MIKE CARLSON: We have
14 it also on our last --
15 it's the first thing you
16 can click, whether EOL and
17 this is on there as well.

18 PRESIDENT POWERS:
19 Thanks, Mike.

20 MIKE CARLSON: I don't
21 have anything in writing
22 but --

23 PRESIDENT POWERS:

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1 We'll pick it up.
 2 PAUL MIKOLOJAK: Paul
 3 Mikolajak, Sing Sing
 4 Prison. December it was
 5 brought up that Workers'
 6 Comp Board has a new
 7 formulary table that
 8 they're going invoke on
 9 June 5th. We had asked if
 10 the Board would consider
 11 taking some sort of
 12 injunction out against
 13 that formulary table until
 14 we find out how badly it
 15 was going to affect all
 16 our members, both present
 17 and retired. What was the
 18 Board's decision on action
 19 on that piece of work?
 20 PRESIDENT POWERS: We
 21 Alex Dell a Workers'
 22 Compensation attorney here
 23 to address the Assembly

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1 tomorrow.
 2 PAUL MIKOLOJAK:
 3 Thank you, sir.
 4 PRESIDENT POWERS:
 5 Anything else for me?
 6 Donn?
 7 DONN ROWE: Rowe, Hale
 8 Creek. Mike, I just got
 9 one thing. As far as the
 10 budget is concerned and
 11 the whole closures and bed
 12 closures, again, it's nice
 13 we got a bill on double
 14 bunking which you know
 15 they're not gonna lift a
 16 finger to save those beds
 17 in neither house, either
 18 the Assembly or Senate.
 19 That bill certainly is not
 20 going to get passed by
 21 April. And they're going
 22 to come to some kind of
 23 agreement.

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1 My biggest issue with
 2 what's going on right now
 3 is we have such a drop in
 4 uniform to inmate ratio
 5 over the past four, five
 6 years. I mean, we've
 7 always hovered right
 8 around three to one and
 9 that's lieutenants,
 10 sergeants, correction
 11 officers. And we've
 12 hovered around 2.8, 2.9.
 13 Right now we're down to
 14 2.3 and it's gonna get
 15 worse. And with all this
 16 crap that they're adding
 17 on in the department, it's
 18 gonna mushroom into a real
 19 staffing issue. Not just
 20 people getting stuck and
 21 all this other stuff.

22 So I think that has to
 23 be a discussion -- I know

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1 I have raised it with you
 2 before, it has to be a
 3 discussion with the
 4 legislature or with the
 5 Governor's office.

6 PRESIDENT POWERS: It
 7 does. And it was part of
 8 the discussion up until
 9 this double bunking. I
 10 Respectfully disagree, I
 11 think our -- I think this
 12 bill was actually moving
 13 and I think it's going to
 14 gain some traction. Will
 15 we see it in the budget?
 16 No, I highly doubt it. I
 17 think that's what you're
 18 expressing but through the
 19 legislative session we're
 20 kind of hoping.

21 We're spending some
 22 money, about 55-K to wrap
 23 some buses in Albany

84

1 regarding the double
2 bunking and the sixteen to
3 one ratio of the housing
4 units. Now, keep in mind
5 a majority of the double
6 bunks are in the medium
7 securities. Annexes
8 double upped as well, but
9 it's more the dormitory
10 type setting.

11 And that's our target.
12 And that's where we're
13 getting a little play,
14 we're getting some play
15 from the speaker in the
16 Assembly. I had a very
17 good conversation with the
18 Deputy Majority Leader
19 Andrea Stewart Cousins and
20 other members of -- higher
21 ranking members of the
22 Senate, some were swayed,
23 some of the newer junior

85

1 point. This is one of the
2 drivers regarding our
3 staffing issue and that
4 ratio is gonna change.
5 That three to one ratio
6 has changed, it changed
7 probably shortly before I
8 got here. And that
9 prompted I believe the
10 staffing reviews.

11 And that was a remedy
12 which has not been
13 fulfilled and now I've got
14 to maintain that
15 fulfillment and then and
16 then more importantly,
17 continue to push for
18 additional staffing. And
19 that training component
20 comes into it as well.

21 Donn mentioned the
22 aspect of the significant
23 changes in the job. I did

87

1 legislators in both
2 houses.

3 And we've had some
4 brief conversations, Keith
5 has had some conversations
6 with the second floor
7 regarding this as well.
8 Our target is we're kind
9 of placating the advocates
10 as I've expressed before.
11 We're basically saying
12 you're housing two
13 individuals in a space
14 smaller than a parking
15 space. You probably heard

17 times, I'll say it to

2 of my report. The
3 training that we have is
4 insufficient and our
5 people are getting
6 disciplined over certain
7 factions, certain actions

14 presentation during your
15 use of force training in
16 the spring.

17 So that's a component
18 of it. So there's a lot

2 that will never go away.
3 I don't believe it will
4 ever go away.

5 In one of the first
6 trainings that I ever took

9 ago, I was always told and
10 I always take this

12 see it number one on the
13 labor management agenda is
14 staffing. Staffing at
15 every facility is always
16 an issue. And you always
17 got to drive that home,
18 that's my personal
19 opinion.

20 I don't believe we'll
21 ever have enough staffing.
22 But that ratio is getting
23 more dangerous in a much

2 PRESIDENT POWERS: Much
3 of the -- much of the
4 argument we make, and I
5 made it to the speaker and
6 the Deputy Majority Leader
7 in the Senate, you keep
8 saying you're going to
9 right size the system.
10 Well, right size it, then

12 a safer environment for us
13 to work in. Stop putting
14 two individuals in a space

15 makes no sense.

16 PRESIDENT POWERS: If
17 you can disperse the
18 inmates in a safer manner,
19 more importantly give us
20 the needs that we need to
21 have. This agency, they
22 were quick to point out it
23 was one of the largest,

1 don't quote me because I'm
2 not sure, I'm sure
3 California and Texas is a
4 bit larger, but all that
5 aside we're rapidly
6 decreasing staffing ratios
7 and training components.
8 Ultimately at the end of
9 the day it boils down to
10 money, they think they're
11 going to be able to save
12 money with the prison
13 closures.

14 KEVIN DONNELLY: And
15 they will until it costs a
16 life.

17 PRESIDENT POWERS: Not
18 only that, but now you got
19 all this vacant tax exempt
20 state property that's
21 shuttered. Have you ever
22 been up to Mount McGregor,
23 driven past Mount

94

1 McGregor? In my opinion
2 it has to be probably the
3 best piece of real estate
4 in the state. The view up
5 there is phenomenal and
6 that facility looks like a
7 cow town.

8 The many facilities --
9 the last two facilities he
10 closed, Livingston and
11 Lincoln, two of the newer
12 ones that his father
13 built. There's no
14 rationale here.

15 They claim it all under
16 money, it's bureaucracy,
17 politics, it turns into a
18 whole grand shit show.
19 There's no consideration
20 for the common sense
21 approach. It's no
22 different than bail
23 reform.

1 I'm not looking to get
2 into this long
3 conversation, but you look
4 at it, it's knee jerk
5 reactions in my opinion.
6 These things are knee jerk
7 reactions, statements.
8 And now you have this
9 coronavirus offsetting
10 this potential savings in
11 the budget.

12 You got the comptroller
13 who I'll listen to ten
14 times out of ten over any
15 other elected official in
16 this state, who is saying
17 we're pretty close to a
18 recession. So, there's a
19 lot of moving parts right
20 now, a shit ton of moving
21 parts.

22 It's a tough situation
23 to navigate. We're

1 confident that we can stay
2 within the navigation and
3 we'll look to offset as
4 much damage as possible
5 without question. I'm
6 tasking Keith and Dan with
7 that, we're still round up
8 in all this.

9 So I want to get back
10 to this campaign, we're
11 wrapping all these
12 twenty-eight buses with
13 this ratios. It's bus

23 refrigerators, microwaves,

2 approval on fans.
3 Rockland PC put in for gym
4 equipment, that's going to
5 go up to the executive
6 level, which is Mike
7 Bellaforte and President
8 Powers. Mohawk is going
9 up for their parking lot
10 to the executive committee
11 level. Franklin,
12 approved. Gowanda
13 approved. Elmira,
14 approved. Auburn was
15 approved partially and I
16 can explain that to Josh

20 Mohawk has put in for
21 something, I don't know
22 whether or not they can

13 90 days.

14 Years back when prison
15 closures were taking
16 place, we always knew
17 which facilities were
18 being targeted. It was
19 listed in the budget, so
20 whether or not there was
21 60 or 90 day, you always
22 had that notice from the
23 day that the budget was

1 introduced.

2 Starting last year they
3 have been extremely vague
4 on which facilities they
5 are targeting. So with
6 that reasoning we're
7 hoping they will least
8 expand the time frame to
9 close the prisons to allow
10 the members to adapt and
11 get their lives in order.
12 We'll continue to push
13 that as the budget
14 negotiations is
15 continuing.

16 Following the PAC --
17 the budget address, we had
18 a PAC reception in Albany

23 is a pretty good showing.

1 count, based on the
2 results either endorse Mr.
3 Specht stack or not.

4 As far as endorsements
5 go, we do get -- like I
6 said, we get a lot of
7 requests, but it's
8 something I would like to
9 try and tamp down, I
10 suppose. Each one based
11 on our constitution
12 requires the members in
13 the effected areas be
14 polled. If 213 races are
15 taking place and we're
16 requesting to endorse a
17 majority of those quite
18 frankly, that's a
19 significant price tag to
20 the organization.

21 So while it might look
22 good on paper for
23 politicians, endorsements

130

1 financially through our
2 PAC fund. We can get our
3 members out to volunteer
4 on their campaigns. My
5 opinion is that is a much
6 more effective way to
7 endorse a candidate then
8 putting it on a piece of
9 paper so they can put it
10 on their literature.

11 So, keep that in mind
12 please. Last thing I will
13 talk about is the Lobby
14 Day. I sent out an e-mail
15 saying Lobby Day will be
16 on April 22nd. On the
17 night of April 21st we
18 have a block of rooms at
19 the Renaissance Hotel. We
20 have about 60 rooms on the

10 want to look at it.
11 Voluntary opting out of
12 NYSCOPBA membership shall
13 be defined as, notifying
14 NYSCOPBA in writing or
15 e-mail of your intent to
16 opt out of being a
17 NYSCOPBA member or
18 refusing to complete a
19 NYSCOPBA membership
20 application as outlined in
21 section three.

22 Then it says, non
23 members can be a dues

173

1 application.
2 Misinformation, mailing
3 issue, misrepresentation,
4 etcetera, or the
5 discretion of the
6 Executive Assembly. Those
7 were the changes that were
8 made.

9 One example I gave if
10 it was a DOCCS issue. For
11 the academy, NYSCOPBA goes
12 to the DOCCS training
13 academy to sign up all the
14 members usually in the
15 first thirty days.
16 Usually the staff or
17 sergeant liaison go. The
18 example I gave, let's say
19 during the time for
20 NYSCOPBA to sign up the
21 new members at the
22 academy, you know, say
23 another escape happens,

175

1 paying member if the
2 member does not have any
3 pending or current
4 investigation or
5 disciplinary action or
6 legal issue that could
7 effect or actions against
8 said non member. And,
9 within the first year of
10 NYSCOPBA is notified of
11 non membership, the
12 comptroller's office, the
13 membership application is
14 filed; or, during initial
15 probation period or
16 evaluation period, first
17 NYSCOPBA protective title;
18 or regional executive
19 board member, representing
20 the region the non member
21 works acknowledges in
22 writing there was an issue
23 with the member

174

1 something happens where
2 all hands on deck, you had
3 to leave as was the case
4 with the escape. If you
5 weren't allowed to get
6 back into the academy
7 until day 46 currently,
8 all those would become non
9 members because that's
10 where the policy currently
11 stands.

12 We need to have a
13 little bit of leeway, but
14 once you opt out, you're
15 out. If you voluntarily
16 opt out, you opt out. I
17 can tell you from speaking
18 to my chiefs this morning,
19 we want every one of our
20 law enforcement members to
21 have an opportunity to be
22 a member. But if they
23 want to opt out, they're

176

1 out.

2 I can tell you as of
3 Monday I had one of the
4 Law Enforcement members
5 who opted out wanted back
6 in and it went in the
7 garbage. That was --
8 because you opted out
9 voluntarily, too bad,
10 you're out. But if you --
11 we should be in the
12 business of making sure we
13 have the most members, who
14 want to be here. Those
15 who don't want to be here,
16 get the hell out. You're
17 out.

18 You know, we got to put
19 it in perspective here,
20 too, this year, that
21 there's a possibility this
22 year depending on closures
23 we could lose somewhere,

177

1 six, seven, eight hundred
2 members. So we'll be down
3 another six, seven, eight
4 hundred dues paying
5 members possibly by the
6 end of 2021.

7 So I'm just looking at
8 this as a little leeway.
9 I know yesterday we didn't
10 have any -- there was no
11 recommendations from the
12 Board. But if people have
13 questions, fire away.

14 VP WEST DEBURGOMASTER:
15 Mark Deburgomaster,
16 Western Region VP. John,
17 I just got a couple
18 questions just for
19 clarity. They are mailed
20 a certified letter from
21 NYSCOPBA with the cards.

22 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
23 HARMON: They're mailed in

178

1 the new membership packet.

2 VP WEST DEBURGOMASTER:
3 So we have verification
4 that they do receive it.
5 That was the question that
6 was raised. Can we prove
7 they were ever sent a
8 letter?

9 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
10 HARMON: All we know they
11 were sent a membership
12 packet. As like with a
13 constitution amendment or
14 any election vote we have,
15 we get two thousand people
16 to vote. So, what do the
17 18 thousand members
18 typically do with that?
19 They throw it in the
20 garbage.

21 I'm not saying it's
22 right. I'm just saying
23 there's an issue with

179

1 that. And one of the
2 issues that we've had over
3 the past with that card
4 is, instead of mailing
5 them in, they would often
6 bring them into the
7 facility and try to
8 attempt to either give it
9 to a steward -- I know
10 some give it to human
11 resources which has
12 nothing to do with that,
13 because they just don't
14 get it.

15 VP WEST DEBURGOMASTER:
16 The other question
17 obviously, I talked with
18 you about it, is the dues
19 concern. I understand at
20 this point we have no
21 mechanism to collect dues
22 for any of these -- and
23 some of these applications

180

1 are seventeen months old.
2 That's something we need
3 to rectify. I get
4 allowing somebody an
5 exemption but we still
6 need to go after dues.

7 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

8 HARMON: So, one of the
9 things when we first
10 discussed this with Janice
11 in the comptroller's
12 office, was the fact that
13 we can not use payroll to
14 go for back dues. That
15 option was told absolutely
16 not, it's not a
17 possibility.

18 VP WEST DEBURGOMASTER:

19 I understand that. And
20 going through the
21 constitution, it would
22 require a constitutional
23 amendment. But I believe

181

1 pending investigations, no
2 pending discipline,
3 nothing that could cause
4 the organization a dollar,
5 then there's nothing there
6 that -- because one of the
7 things that came up when
8 the Janus stuff was coming
9 up, that we asked for back
10 possibly be held liable
11 for anything if we got the
12 dues for something that
13 they weren't part of and
14 now they're paying back
15 dues and they're eligible.

16 That was -- but I'm
17 just saying that if we put
18 the caveat in there that
19 there's nothing that could
20 cost the organization a
21 dollar, because
22 technically if they die
23 before this, they don't

183

1 we should actively seek --
2 I get it because the whole
3 thing, if nothing else,
4 forward this over so we
5 can get a constitutional
6 amendment to fix this so
7 we can collect the dues.
8 Whether it's through
9 calculations done by our
10 accounting staff, just to
11 fix it. If you're going
12 to allow them back in to
13 preserve the members, I
14 think we need to go after
15 those dues that everyone
16 else paid for that same
17 period of time.

18 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

19 HARMON: The one thing
20 with that and why I
21 respectfully disagree is
22 that, because we're saying
23 that you don't have no

182

1 get the life insurance
2 policy. Anybody up to
3 this point has not been
4 entitled to anything
5 that's offered except for
6 the bare minimum that the
7 statute allows.

8 VP WEST DEBURGOMASTER:

9 And they receive the
10 benefits of the negotiated
11 contract.

12 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

13 HARMON: Yeah, they only
14 get the first step
15 contractual grievance
16 process and that's it.
17 Dougie?

18 DOUG WESTERVELT:

19 Westervelt, South Port. I
20 think you have to go back
21 for back dues. We pay
22 back dues. We pay retro.
23 So, they received the

184

1 benefits of the pay raise,
2 all the negotiations, they
3 received the cards. I'm
4 not going for they didn't
5 receive the card, because
6 like you said, it's in the
7 packet.

8 I think it's a bit of a
9 cop out and then play the
10 game for as long as you
11 think you can play it, now
12 they see what's going on
13 in the system, now they
14 think they need the
15 protection.

16 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

17 HARMON: That's not true.

18 DOUG WESTERVELT: We
19 all paid our dues from day
20 one. So go back and get
21 them back. If they need a
22 payment plan, go back -- I
23 mean, I don't know the

185

1 time frame what type of
2 monies are gonna have to
3 be paid on the back dues
4 situation, but if they
5 need some type of payment
6 plan, they should be able
7 to work that out.

8 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

9 HARMON: Okay.

10 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:

11 Mike Mazzella, Mid-Hudson
12 Region VP. My question on
13 the policy is the one
14 section that states, you
15 know, within one year of
16 NYSCOPBA being notified by
17 the comptroller's office
18 as the time frame,
19 underneath that it states
20 something about
21 probationary period.

22 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

23 HARMON: Yep. Because

186

1 with law enforcement most
2 of our members do a one
3 year, but a lot of them go
4 beyond the one year in the
5 trainingship status or
6 probationary status
7 because they either didn't
8 have the academy or they
9 didn't meet the initial
10 requirements to get off
11 probation. So they often
12 extend people or keep them
13 past the year.

14 So that's when we --
15 you Safety Security
16 Officers is the only title
17 that has a standing
18 academy but we often don't
19 see them until -- I'll
20 give you a for instance.
21 The academy starts -- it
22 just started this week.
23 Most of those guys in

187

1 there already have eight
2 months to a year on the
3 job, if not longer.
4 They've already passed the
5 one year period.

6 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:

7 But the question is if
8 we're in -- wouldn't it
9 be -- is it more logical
10 to think that we'll get
11 notified by the
12 comptroller's office
13 first?

14 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

15 HARMON: We get notified
16 by the comptroller's
17 office in, I believe after
18 two pay periods or
19 something like that.
20 That's when the initial
21 new member packet was
22 supposed to go out.

23 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:

188

1 That's what I'm saying.
 2 So two pay periods after
 3 they get hired, we're
 4 getting notified by the
 5 comptroller's office --
 6 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 7 HARMON: Yeah, I believe
 8 it's six to eight weeks
 9 later.
 10 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
 11 So why don't we just leave
 12 it to one year from that
 13 point, if that's what the
 14 body agrees. Why would we
 15 add the thing about the
 16 probationary period. That
 17 gives them a longer time
 18 to become members.
 19 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 20 HARMON: So you're --
 21 saying strike --
 22 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
 23 I'm not saying, I'm

189

1 asking. What -- what's
 2 the logic behind it.
 3 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 4 HARMON: I'll use the
 5 twenty-four SUNY campuses
 6 we have members at, that
 7 we often don't even see
 8 these guys. Even when you
 9 go there to look for them,
 10 based on work sites or
 11 whatever. I'll use Mike
 12 Carlson's guys, for an
 13 example, in the summer
 14 they might be camped out
 15 in the woods. We've
 16 actually gone to look for
 17 some of these guys who
 18 don't have cards signed
 19 up, so finding them to
 20 actually sign the card.
 21 And again, I'm not saying
 22 it's right but our
 23 organization has had

190

1 historical problem with
 2 our membership throwing
 3 shit out. To get two
 4 thousand people to vote on
 5 a constitutional
 6 amendment, that might be a
 7 lot. We don't get
 8 typically sixty percent to
 9 vote on the contract.
 10 So, there's an issue of
 11 our voting body voting.
 12 And so -- and it reflects
 13 on this -- for law
 14 enforcement it reflects on
 15 this.
 16 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
 17 I guess the last question
 18 I had was, we talked about
 19 mailings going to the
 20 members. Is that
 21 certified mail, do they
 22 have to sign for it to
 23 pick it up?

191

1 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 2 HARMON: No, it's just
 3 direct mail.
 4 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
 5 Thank you.
 6 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 7 HARMON: Ricky?
 8 RICK SMITH: Ricky
 9 Smith, Mid Hudson SSO.
 10 You touched on it that as
 11 far as getting to our
 12 members once they come on
 13 board and some of them are
 14 so spread apart. It's
 15 hard getting to them.
 16 In my area I'm all way
 17 the way up here, Albany,
 18 I'm all the way down in
 19 the City. And our
 20 members, they get these
 21 packets and they truly
 22 don't understand them.
 23 Some of them take for

192

1 granted it's
2 self-explanatory but
3 they're looking for me to
4 come or one of the other
5 stewards to come and
6 explain this to them.

7 So this gives us that
8 opportunity and time to
9 get to there and get these
10 members. I have members
11 who want to be in our
12 membership, want to be in
13 NYSCOPBA, and they're
14 coming to meetings and
15 saying, hey, I didn't get
16 this or I didn't get that,
17 I'm trying to follow up or
18 whatever the case may be.
19 So I think this is a good
20 thing.

21 MIKE CARLSON: Mike
22 Carlson. Yeah, John, the
23 turn over that my guys,

193

1 to get the money of the
2 them. So, I appreciate
3 you stepping up for them
4 and trying to get the
5 money from them.

6 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

7 HARMON: One of the issues
8 so people know is, when is
9 the last safety security
10 officer academy, they
11 actually had one of their
12 officers there who was
13 just about a year in or
14 more, he was told by his
15 facility that he doesn't
16 have a union. There is no
17 NYSCOPBA, there is no
18 union. So he wasn't
19 signing a card. He says,
20 I don't have a union. We
21 had to pull him aside and
22 say that's not true.
23 He was wasn't going to

195

1 you never know who's
2 coming back. And our
3 biggest problem is
4 personnel, not giving the
5 packets out to guys. I
6 have a 168 different
7 facilities or statewide
8 parks or recreation
9 centers that they would be
10 working at. And the
11 personnel last year, I had
12 a guy that said no, I
13 signed the docket or I
14 signed -- I'm telling you
15 I signed it. Come to find
16 out, he got a CSEA package
17 to sign, not NYSCOPBA.

18 So personnel is half
19 the problem. I don't want
20 my guys being penalized.
21 If they're going to be
22 here, they're going to get
23 the benefits, we're going

194

1 sign a card until we
2 explained to him, no,
3 NYSCOPBA is your union.

4 ANTHONY HENDERSON:

5 Anthony Henderson, Chief
6 sector steward, safety
7 security officers. What I
8 can see is a break down of
9 the system because even
10 the people that have
11 gotten the packages,
12 they're not getting to the
13 proper place. And that's
14 going to create a problem.

15 I personally at my
16 facility, I see a new
17 member, I sign them up
18 regardless if he sent the
19 package in. That's just
20 me, I don't expect every
21 steward or every chief
22 sector steward to do that,
23 but I do it. I do it as a

196

1 safeguard because I can't
2 afford to not have a
3 member with
4 representation.

5 So, as far as I'm
6 concerned, it's a break
7 down of the system, that
8 needs to be repaired. If
9 this is the way we can
10 repair it by giving them
11 some leeway, I'm all for
12 it.

13 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

14 HARMON: Again, so people
15 understand, with law
16 enforcement most of our
17 chiefs are either
18 statewide elected chiefs
19 or regional elected
20 chiefs, so most of our
21 chiefs aren't in a
22 building with a lot of
23 people who are there. So,

197

1 that's -- it's been --
2 it's just an issue in
3 logistics of law
4 enforcement.

5 MR. CANNON: Cannon
6 Gowanda Correctional, so
7 my question is this, I
8 think all of us in here
9 would like to see a larger
10 group whenever we can. In
11 this case we've seen and
12 everybody has repeated it,
13 there is a obviously a
14 systematic problem. Have
15 we done anything to look
16 at that?

17 I can see a lot of us
18 maybe making the
19 concession today to accept
20 these new members today
21 based on me knowing that
22 there is a problem there.
23 Have we worked on creating

198

1 a solution to that problem
2 or is this something we're
3 going to have to revisit
4 every EA when we say, hey,
5 we got twelve more guys,
6 hey, we got thirty more
7 guys?

8 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

9 HARMON: From looking at
10 it from our side and
11 talking to my chiefs this
12 morning and my business
13 agents in our office
14 meeting, we believe that
15 the changes that were made
16 to the policy will
17 definitely keep it -- if
18 we don't get it now, then
19 that means we screwed up.
20 So the changes to the
21 policy we believe will
22 remedy the situation.

23 MR. CANNON: And what

199

1 changes are those?

2 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

3 HARMON: The changes where
4 it says under Section 3,
5 you can't be under any
6 investigation or
7 disciplinary action, so if
8 you're under investigation
9 basically you can't get
10 it. Now, when you get
11 over that and you paid
12 your own money, fix your
13 issue, then you can
14 reapply. But if you're
15 under investigation,
16 that's a no, that's an
17 automatic no to get in.

18 But then in your first
19 year you can ask -- when
20 we get notified by the
21 comptroller's office or
22 when Stephanie, membership
23 services gets notified or

200

1 during your initial
2 probationary period, it
3 says so if somebody gets
4 promoted they can't say
5 hey, I got promoted, I
6 want to get back into
7 NYSCOPBA. No, you already
8 opted out, you're out.

9 For the regional
10 executive vice president
11 to have a caveat to say
12 hey listen, there's a
13 systematic break down
14 here, here it is in
15 writing, this is what
16 happened, let's fix it.

17 MR. CANNON: So, have
18 we looked at how we are
19 going to get this
20 information to these
21 members so in the future
22 it doesn't happen?

23 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

201

1 HARMON: One of the things
2 is, again, it will still
3 be the packets but through
4 this process we'll have
5 more time because
6 currently it's forty-five
7 days. So this process
8 will allow us to have the
9 time to make sure these
10 people get signed up.

11 I'll be honest with
12 you, this would be our
13 failure if they don't get
14 signed up now. It
15 wouldn't be the member's
16 failure. This would be
17 our failure. So these
18 changes should exactly
19 remedy all that situation.
20 And talking with my chiefs
21 this morning and with my
22 office guys, and they
23 agree with too.

202

1 MR. CANNON: Basically
2 you're saying this is
3 going to be a one time
4 event.

5 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

6 HARMON: That's it.

7 AL CHRISTIAN: Al
8 Christian, law enforcement
9 business agent.

10 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

11 HARMON: Hold on, you got
12 to ask permission to
13 speak.

14 AL CHRISTIAN:
15 Permission to speak.

16 PRESIDENT POWERS: Yes.

17 AL CHRISTIAN: I was
18 notified by one of our
19 members at one of the SUNY
20 SSA-1, they put him under
21 the teachers union. So
22 now I have to do a little
23 research and find out how

203

1 that happened.

2 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT

3 HARMON: And then we've
4 had an unfortunate issue
5 with some of our titles
6 they put them in CSEA,
7 teachers union, other
8 unions, because --
9 actually we don't know
10 why. We had to fight to
11 get them back. If you go
12 by the guidelines we
13 currently have, they would
14 be outside the guidelines
15 because they would be
16 outside the guidelines.
17 And so, those are issues
18 that law enforcement
19 particularly has just
20 general to us. Because we
21 have some titles that are
22 similar to some titles
23 that other bargaining

204

1 units have and some of the
2 appointing authorities do
3 not understand that. And
4 then we have to go look
5 for clarification to make
6 it happen. Al?

7 AL ZAPPALA: Al
8 Zappala, Shawangunk. On
9 the finance committee
10 standpoint, we have a lot
11 of guys right now that
12 John is going to be asking
13 us to bring in. And I
14 agree that we need to make
15 our organization bigger
16 than it already is.
17 Bringing in twenty guys
18 brings us another thirteen
19 thousand a year.

20 What organization
21 wouldn't want to increase
22 the money if under the
23 guidelines, like John is

205

1 saying, these people did
2 not understand the
3 importance of joining the
4 union. Because I know
5 myself, our members get
6 things in the mail, we
7 post things above the time
8 clock and they don't see
9 it. It's not for us
10 stewards to say, hey, did
11 you see that, did you look
12 at that, did you get that;
13 in one ear and out the
14 other.

15 They don't have
16 stewards that are there to
17 do that, to do that grunt
18 work. So there should be
19 a time frame that they
20 have where they're able to
21 go out and get those
22 members. I appreciate,
23 John, you got somebody who

206

1 dropped out and trying to
2 get back in, you didn't
3 have a packet. That's the
4 whole purpose of why we
5 originally came up with
6 these policies for those
7 that leave and don't want
8 to come back. But for
9 those that didn't know the
10 opportunity that was there
11 or the seriousness behind
12 it, I think we need to
13 pass this policy.

14 I would like to do one
15 thing, can we put in that
16 policy, it could already
17 be there, like you have
18 interrogation, could we
19 put that if it's from an
20 incident that occurred
21 prior to the member
22 joining that they're not
23 entitled --

207

1 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
2 HARMON: Yeah, it says the
3 non member does not have
4 any pending or current
5 investigations or legal
6 actions that could affect
7 their employment for the
8 non member.

9 AL ZAPPALA: Okay. I
10 back the motion and I
11 thank you for coming
12 forward and doing that and
13 trying to make this place
14 bigger than we already
15 are.

16 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
17 HARMON: Thank you.

18 ROBERT STEVENS: Robert
19 Stevens, Mohawk. Just a
20 quick question about the
21 titles, the employer was
22 signing with CSEA or NYSUT
23 or whoever, were they

208

1 paying -- if they were
 2 paying dues to that
 3 union --
 4 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 5 HARMON: We don't know
 6 that.
 7 ROBERT STEVENS: If
 8 that comes out that they
 9 were, would that be
 10 something we can recover
 11 those dues from that other
 12 union because we were
 13 supposed to represent them
 14 in the first place?
 15 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 16 HARMON: Again, they would
 17 have to sign a card with
 18 that bargaining unit. And
 19 who knows if they are
 20 doing that even at all.
 21 We don't know any of those
 22 things when they happen
 23 because -- we won't know.

209

1 Usually it's somebody
 2 saying hey, we got told by
 3 another title that those
 4 three individuals got
 5 placed in other bargaining
 6 unit. We find out third
 7 person.
 8 ROBERT STEVENS: Do you
 9 know if they would
 10 represent them or would
 11 they just say thanks for
 12 the money, have a nice
 13 day?
 14 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 15 HARMON: We wouldn't know
 16 that. We'd have to try to
 17 get money from another
 18 bargaining unit and that's
 19 probably an act of God.
 20 ROBERT STEVENS: Fair
 21 enough, thank you.
 22 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 23 HARMON: Anthony?

210

1 ANTHONY HENDERSON:
 2 Chief sector steward,
 3 Anthony Henderson. I just
 4 want to reiterate what
 5 John said. We're dealing
 6 with 18 different titles.
 7 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 8 HARMON: 30.
 9 ANTHONY HENDERSON: 30
 10 different titles in 18
 11 facilities, I believe.
 12 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 13 HARMON: 30 titles, 15
 14 agencies.
 15 ANTHONY HENDERSON: It
 16 makes it a very complex
 17 situation because these
 18 personnel departments
 19 within law enforcement,
 20 they're all different
 21 unions or same unions, so
 22 it becomes a problem with
 23 them sorting everything

211

1 out because they have no
 2 clue, as far as what I'm
 3 trying to say.
 4 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 5 HARMON: Anybody else?
 6 So, as the policy is
 7 written in your packet,
 8 looking for all those in
 9 favor of the policy as
 10 drafted and changed,
 11 signify by saying aye.
 12
 13 (All respond with aye.)
 14
 15 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 16 HARMON: Nays?
 17
 18 (No response.).
 19
 20 VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
 21 HARMON: Thank you very
 22 much.
 23 RECORDING SECRETARY

1 SUMMERS: Can I have
2 everyone's attention?
3 We're gonna do something a
4 little different since
5 that policy just changed.
6 In your packets you'll see
7 there's eight motions in
8 here that we're going to
9 withdraw right now and six

14 I'm going to read the
15 motions now that passed
16 underneath the new
17 guidelines. To approve
18 membership card for E.
19 Morton, underneath the new
20 guidelines, it passed. To
21 approve membership card
22 for P. Reed, passed. To
23 approve the membership

214

1 card for M. Miller,
2 passed. To approve
3 membership card for J.
4 Perillo, passed. To
5 approve membership card
6 for M. Wilder, passed.
7 Last one, to approve
8 membership card for B.
9 Cooney, passed.

10 PRESIDENT POWERS: All
11 right. Another motion,
12 to interpret NYSCOPBA
13 constitution, Article 8,
14 Section B, sector
15 meetings. Which states,
16 it shall be the
17 responsibility of the
18 individual sector steward
19 or stewards to hold
20 regular association
21 meetings for their
22 membership to mean that it
23 is the local sector

215

1 stewards who are
2 responsible for choosing
3 when and where the local
4 sector meetings will take
5 place.

6 The motion is made by
7 Al Zappala, seconded by
8 Steve Murphy out of
9 Fishkill. Any discussion?

11 (No response.)

13 AL ZAPPALA: Al
14 ZAPPALA, Shawangunk. I
15 felt it was pretty
16 self-explanatory.
17 Basically what I'm asking
18 is, in the NYSCOPBA
19 constitution under Article
20 13, Section B it states,
21 it shall be the
22 responsibility of the
23 sector stewards to hold

216

1 the regular association
2 meetings for the
3 membership. And as the
4 interpretation I'm asking
5 from this EA is because
6 under Article 10,
7 Executive Assembly,
8 Section 8, paragraph
9 three, it states: the
10 Executive Assembly shall
11 have the authority to
12 interpret this
13 constitution and bylaws,
14 and all controversies
15 arising thereunder. Any
16 interpretation adopted by
17 majority vote Executive
18 Assembly in good faith
19 shall be bodied upon all
20 members, officials, and
21 officers.

22 So basically what I'm
23 asking is, is it the

217

1 that were elected to pick
2 or not? The reason I
3 bring this up is when a
4 motion is made by the
5 members at your local
6 sector, you have to a
7 oblige that motion, you
8 have to follow the
9 direction of the
10 membership. Sometimes the
11 members can make these
12 motions not realizing they
13 put you guys, us stewards,
14 in harms way.

15 Because if a motion is
16 made, I want to make a
17 motion to have the meeting
18 two hours from here, and
19 you get a bunch of people
20 that like that idea, we
21 the stewards have to
22 follow that motion if it
23 passes and if we don't

1 stewards that are
2 responsible for holding
3 the meetings, picking
4 where the meetings are at?
5 Because under this
6 interpretation that I see,
7 it empowers us, we are the
8 ones holding the meetings,
9 we're the ones looking out
10 for the members, we're the
11 ones putting everything
12 together. Or, is it the
13 members who make a motion,
14 vote on it and turn, force
15 our hand to have meetings
16 where we really shouldn't
17 have it or, slash, places
18 we really shouldn't have
19 it.

20 That's what I asking
21 for. What do you guys
22 feel the interpretation
23 is? Is it the stewards

218

1 follow that motion, we're
2 in violation of judicial
3 ethics charges. So, we
4 put ourselves in jeopardy.

5 So that's the reason I
6 brought this up today. I
7 wanted clarification
8 because depending on who
9 you talk to, you get
10 different people reading
11 it different ways.

12 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
13 Mike Mazzella, Mid-Hudson
14 region vice president.
15 Basically it all depends
16 on following -- when he's
17 talking about following
18 the will of your
19 membership, okay, we do
20 understand that chief
21 sector stewards,
22 presidents, regional vice
23 presidents, we all have a

220

1 fiduciary responsibility
2 to this organization.
3 And, of course, if
4 somebody were to make a
5 motion, let's say, to have
6 a meeting two hours away
7 at a grand catering hall,
8 that's not fiduciary
9 responsibility to say no,
10 we're not going to
11 entertain that.

12 Okay. But when a
13 member is making a motion
14 to have a meeting placed
15 at a fire house down the
16 road next to the facility,
17 or at QWL, or we want to
18 make sure that when we go
19 to these meetings that the
20 lights are on. That's the
21 will of the membership.

22 Just my opinion, again,
23 listen, everybody runs

221

1 their sectors how they run
2 their sectors and I get
3 that. I was a chief
4 sector steward too. But I
5 can tell you I always went
6 with the will of the
7 membership and never my
8 will. That's all I'm
9 saying. Thank you.

10 PRESIDENT POWERS: I
11 tend to agree with VP
12 Mazzella. An issue that I
13 ran into years ago when I
14 was a chief, and Billy
15 Sellers may be able to
16 attest to this as well, a
17 lot of people assumed in a
18 small community like
19 Ogdensburg that we were
20 catering to one particular
21 person, whether it be an
22 organization, a VFW,
23 Knights of Columbus,

222

1 Amvets, whatever the case
2 may be.

3 A lot of times we ran
4 into friction there, so
5 ultimately the membership
6 directs and governs this
7 body to a degree and, you
8 know, that's pretty much
9 my position. You know, we
10 are at the will of the
11 membership. And when the
12 membership comes in and
13 suggests they move a
14 venue, whether QWL or non
15 profit organization or
16 whatever the case may be.
17 So that's my position.

18 AL ZAPPALA: I'd just
19 like to give a little bit
20 real quick clarification
21 about why we're at where
22 we're at. I totally
23 understand where

223

1 Mr. Powers, Mr. Mazzella
2 they make their claims for
3 the betterment. But right
4 now I'm involved in a
5 situation where some
6 members want to have our
7 members at a QWL, others
8 want to have it at a fire
9 house or whatnot.

10 My position has been
11 when you have your
12 meetings at a QWL, you're
13 on facility grounds. When
14 you're locked out you're
15 not allowed on facility
16 grounds. This occurred to
17 me, I was locked out three
18 years ago, I was not
19 allowed to go to our QWL
20 meeting. And I set up a
21 chair, along with another
22 steward across the street
23 on the road like an

224

1 animal, to answer
2 questions. Because if I
3 stepped foot on that QWL
4 grounds I was
5 insubordinate and I would
6 have been locked out for
7 other charges.

8 The question here is,
9 two and a half years ago
10 when I brought this to my
11 membership they agreed and
12 they liked the idea that
13 you know what, you're
14 right, when your members
15 need you the most, they
16 should be able to come to
17 that meeting. You can't
18 come to that meeting when
19 it's at a QWL. So we
20 asked our members, what do
21 you guys want to do? And
22 we let them vote.

23 And we knew because

225

1 those people that were
2 there at those meetings
3 understand and always come
4 to those meetings, they
5 would do the right thing
6 for the members and they
7 did. And we have had it
8 at a fire house for the
9 last two and a half years.

10 Now, so much time has
11 passed, time people
12 forget. We have a small
13 group of people that want
14 to move it back to the
15 QWL. So what do we do?

16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:
17 No one cares.

18 AL ZAPPALA: Sir, you
19 can have your say at the
20 mic when I'm done if you'd
21 like, but please refrain
22 from speaking while I'm
23 talking.

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1 PRESIDENT POWERS: Come
2 on.

3 AL ZAPPALA: End result
4 is this, current
5 situation, now I got some
6 guys that want to have it
7 back at a QWL, so i'm
8 about ready to have a QWL
9 vote. Now, the other
10 faction says, well, next
11 month we'll come out and
12 we'll get more people and
13 we'll move it back to the
14 fire house. My meetings
15 are about to become a
16 mockery because every
17 month this faction will
18 bring out more people,
19 next month that faction
20 brings out more people.
21 And we're having meetings
22 to have votes to have it
23 this way and that way,

227

1 back and forth.

2 The way this comes to
3 an end, I said to the
4 members, we'll let an
5 interpretation at the EA
6 do this. I'm not gonna
7 argue with you guys. I
8 feel because I was elected
9 I'm doing what's right for
10 the members. And what I
11 said, why would you want
12 to have it at a QWL when
13 someone who is locked out
14 can't go there. And the
15 answer was, "F" them, it's
16 got nothing to do with me.
17 But you know what --

18 PRESIDENT POWERS: Al,
19 Al, you made your point.

20 AL ZAPPALA: Okay.

21 MIKE CARLSON: I like
22 my sector to be separate
23 from the EA here. I want

228

1 my members to make the
2 decision, where we're
3 going to me, what we're
4 going to do as a
5 membership. I really
6 rather not have the EA
7 tell me or tell my members
8 what we're gonna do.

9 AL ZAPPALA: That's not
10 the point of it.

11 MIKE CARLSON: Right.
12 But if we put it in the
13 constitution bylaws that's
14 what -- that's not what
15 I want. Either that or
16 refer to the constitution
17 and bylaws committee for
18 review.

19 PRESIDENT POWERS:

20 Mike?

21 VP MID-HUDSON MAZZELLA:
22 Mike Mazzella, Mid Hudson.
23 Basically the only thing

229

1 that's being asked of us
2 today is, does the
3 constitution say that the
4 chief steward or the
5 stewards will select where
6 meetings are held and on
7 what days they're held or
8 does it not say that.
9 That's all we're asking.

10 So, I mean, that's all
11 he's asking. So for us to
12 be piling on all things on
13 that are convoluting the
14 question. The question is
15 pretty similar, does the
16 constitution say the chief
17 steward and the stewards
18 will pick where the
19 meetings are and on what
20 days, or does it not say
21 that. That's all.

22 ANTHONY HENDERSON:
23 Chief Sector Steward

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1 Anthony Henderson, Safety
2 and Security Officer,
3 Southern Region. I agree
4 with that gentleman. I
5 was locked out a couple
6 years ago, they had a
7 membership steward meeting
8 on state grounds and I
9 wasn't allowed to go. So
10 I empathize with what the
11 gentleman is saying, it
12 should be left up to the
13 membership to decide.

14 PRESIDENT POWERS: Do I
15 need to read -- Donn?

16 DONN ROWE: Rowe, Hale
17 Creek. The membership and
18 stewards should consider
19 that in situations. Al, I
20 agree with your motion but
21 not what I think you're
22 trying to get at. You are
23 responsible for when and

231

1 where your meetings are
2 held by the constitution.
3 But I believe so are your
4 members.

5 If you are to write
6 this sole authority of the
7 sector stewards for
8 choosing when and where
9 the sector meetings will
10 be held, I'd be opposed to
11 that. But yes, you are
12 responsible, but I believe
13 your members are also and
14 you need to work together.

15 PRESIDENT POWERS:

16 Thank you, Donn. Shawn?

17 SHAWN KEENAN: Keenan,
18 Wende. Did you, either
19 one of you, put into your
20 administration to be there
21 for that meeting? There
22 are exceptions. You can
23 request from your

232

1 superintendent to be at
2 that meeting at the QWL.
3 We have had it done.
4 We've had benefits for
5 members that have been
6 locked out, they were
7 permitted to come to that
8 benefit and also go to a
9 meeting at QWL on state
10 grounds. So it's an
11 option to look at, too.

12 PRESIDENT POWERS:

13 Thank you, Shawn.

14 Anthony?

15 ANTHONY HENDERSON:

16 Chief Sector Steward
17 Anthony Henderson, Safety
18 and Security Officers.
19 Yes, I did put in a
20 request and I was denied
21 by administration.

22 PRESIDENT POWERS: For
23 the record, right? Do I

1 read the motion again? To
2 interpret NYSCOPBA
3 constitution, Article 8,
4 Section B, sector
5 meetings. Which states,
